### **A 30-DAY CHALLENGE TO CONNECT, REBUILD, AND LEAD**

## 30 Days to Redeeming Fatherhood

Each day, choose one small way to deepen or rebuild a connection with your child.

<b>DAY 1</b>  Pray for your child by name. Ask God to direct you in the coming days.	<b>DAY 2</b>  Text or tell them you were thinking about them today.	<b>DAY 3</b>  Reflect: What do I admire most about my child?	<b>DAY 4</b>  Ask: "What's one memory from your childhood that meant a lot to you?"	<b>DAY 5</b>  Share a story from your childhood—funny, vulnerable, or real.
<b>DAY 6</b>  Tell them one thing you admire about them.	<b>DAY 7</b>  Say: "I'm proud of you." (And mean it.)	<b>DAY 8</b>  Ask: "What's something you're excited about right now?"	<b>DAY 9</b>  Send a Bible verse that reminds you of them..	<b>DAY 10</b>  Write down one thing you'd do differently—and why.
<b>DAY 11</b>  Invite them to a meal, coffee, or walk. No agenda. Just time	<b>DAY 12</b>  Ask for forgiveness. Even for something small.	<b>DAY 13</b>  Share or send a funny photo or inside joke.	<b>DAY 14</b>  Look at a photo from their childhood. Thank God for their life.	<b>DAY 15</b>  Ask: "What do you need most from me right now?"
<b>DAY 16</b>  Ask: "What brings you joy these days?"	<b>DAY 17</b>  Compliment their character—not their achievements.	<b>DAY 18</b>  Send a voice memo or note: "Just wanted you to know I love you."	<b>DAY 19</b>  Ask about a challenge they're facing. Just listen - don't fix.	<b>DAY 20</b>  Share a time when you failed—and what you learned.
<b>DAY 21</b>  Ask: "What's something you wish I knew?"	<b>DAY 22</b>  Do something unexpected and kind for them.	<b>DAY 23</b>  Write a short prayer or blessing for their life.	<b>DAY 24</b>  Invite them into a decision you're making. Ask for their input.	<b>DAY 25</b>  Tell them something they taught you.
<b>DAY 26</b>  Share a Bible verse that's shaped you as a father.	<b>DAY 27</b>  Ask about their dreams —then ask how you can support them.	<b>DAY 28</b>  Share a favorite memory of them.	<b>DAY 29</b>  Thank them for something they've done —recent or long ago.	<b>DAY 30</b>  Reflect: What has God been teaching me through this journey? Write it down.

### Some Tips:

- **Keep this somewhere visible—on the fridge, your bathroom mirror, or your desk at work.**
- **Miss a day? No problem - just go to the next day.**
- **Don't treat this like a checklist. Before each activity, take a moment to pray. Ask God to give you a heart that's open, humble, and willing to grow.**
